Your Self

Two young D.C.-area artists salvage the art of the self-portrait

GALLERIES | The art of portrait painting is rather out of style among young contemporary artists, unless the sitters are grotesque, imaginary or so famous as to render the reproduction of their very images ironic.

But for a couple of young local talents now on display at Fraser Gallery, the mirror is fraught with enough love, loathing and history to feed the painters' sense of drama as well as their aesthetic needs.

Scott Hutchison creates unflinching, dramatic portraits of himself, some in extreme close-up, in an ancient-church-walls palette of grays, browns and blues, and paints female nudes, truncated Courbet-style or elongated, in brilliant rich pastels.

Caroline Danforth uses her brush with as much agility as she twists and poses. Her small oils on wood focus on the sinuous, sinewy curve of her spine or her broad, frank facial features, and she mixes the tender pinky-beige of her fleshtones with a poisonous green for the shadows.
